



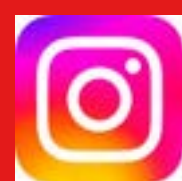

Ysgol Y Parc is an Infant only Primary School maintained by Denbighshire County Council. Our pupils are aged 3 to 7. On site there is also a pre-school provision called Ffrindiau Bach CIC who provide wrap around care from 2 years old. They also run our after school club (up to 11 years old).

In the mornings we run a Breakfast Club from 7:30am (at a small cost, free from 8:10am) until 8:40am.

Our school is central to the wonderful community of Denbigh and surrounding areas. Here at Ysgol y Parc we nurture strong foundations for learning encompassing the Curriculum for Wales, ensuring that all children have the best possible start in life and care in Wales.

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BASIC INFORMATION

At Ysgol Y Parc we are very lucky to have our school building in an open setting with a wonderful outdoor space. The school was built in 1973 and as the school grew an extension was built in 1996. We are a community school with facilities for educating children between the ages of 3 to 7. The school has a hard play area with a large grassed area for play times, and an adventure playground on the main playing field.

All classrooms have their own designated outdoor areas for outdoor learning. There is a school farm which currently houses a sheep, chickens and ducks. The school has an excellent Forest School site which has its own outdoor classroom, called 'Caban Coed'.

The classes are divided as follows

- Nursery age children 0.5 sessions a week Age 3 - 4
- Reception age children: Full time Age 4 - 5
- Year 1 children: Full time Age 5 - 6
- Year 2 children: Full time Age 6 - 7

THE SCHOOL DAY

School opens at 8.40 in the morning for children to enter their classrooms. Children will be greeted at the door by a member of staff and taken into the classroom.

The School day finishes at 3pm.

The school day is as follows

- Nursery 8.45 - 11:15
- Reception, Year 1 and 2 8:40 - 3.00

Year 1 and 2 children have a play time in the morning. All pupils have an hour for dinner time. There will be a member of the Teaching Staff on duty during all play times. There are four lunchtime supervisors on duty during the dinner break.



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CLASS ORGANISATION

It is the decision of the headteacher, with the support of the class teachers, as to how classes are organised. When organising classes, there are several factors to take into account. The number of pupils in each class must be evenly distributed and staffing levels must be considered. Pupils are given the opportunity to state their friendship groups and twins, cousins and other relatives are encouraged where possible to be placed into separate classes to encourage their individuality and develop their personal and social skills further.

LEARNING PHASES

Learning phases mean that Ysgol y Parc and Ysgol Frongoch overlap. We welcome this, as it creates a sense of continuity and familiarity that will help with transition and learning. Working collaboratively with Ysgol Frongoch has led to professional dialogue about skills coverage and how best to support our pupils.

- It was decided that the first Learning Phase would be Nursery and Reception, and this will be known as the Little Acorns. This is where the seeds of learning and growth are sown and strong foundations are laid.
- Years 1, 2 and 3, which is the physical and educational transition phase will be known as the Mighty Oaks. This phase is where the strength and confidence grow resilience and curiosity, to branch out and learn more.
- Years 4, 5 and 6 will be known as the Red Robins. This fits well with the ethos of becoming prepared to fly the nest, from the 'Mighty Oak'.

We currently have...

Nursery and Reception Unit called Little Acorns which comprises of three classes

Three Year 1 and 2 mixed classes called The Mighty Oaks



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EXTRA CURRICULAR

We offer a wide range of After School Clubs that run at various times throughout the year, such as...

- Art
- Singing
- Yoga
- Cookery
- Forest School
- Running
- Urdd
- Book Club
- Eco Club
- Walk and Talk

These clubs take place after school until 4pm. They are led by Teachers. Letters are sent out at the beginning of the term detailing which clubs will be available and at which times of the year. The school Senedd listen to pupil voice and make suggestions to staff with regards to the type of clubs that are of interest.

Clubs usually begin after the first half term break in Autumn term when all children have settled back into school life here at Ysgol y Parc.

Oaks 1, 2 and 3 are mixed Year 1 and 2 classes run by Ms Cannon (our Deputy Headteacher), Miss Hughes and Mrs Perry. Our teaching assistants are Miss Jones, Mrs Morgan and Miss King. We are fortunate enough have volunteers that help us through the week; Mrs Eva Edwards (our chair of governors), Mrs Joyce Jones and Mrs McCarthy-Morris.

We aim to provide a varied, engaging and exciting curriculum which challenges and motivates our learners. We are committed to providing a range of learning experiences both in the classroom and outdoors, with opportunities to develop their skills in our outdoor provision and in Forest School.

Our teaching is delivered through a topic based approach which is heavily influenced by the ideas of the learners and takes their interests into consideration. Our Senedd in year 2 help us to link pupil voice with teacher planning and we work as a team to provide the best learning experiences possible for the children in our care.

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OUR SCHOOL - WHAT MAKES IT SO SPECIAL?

The teachers, teaching assistants and all other staff at Ysgol y Parc are passionate about the privilege to work with children. They understand that they are part of a team who are able to inspire and encourage the next generation and they all take their responsibility very seriously.

The Governing Body works closely with the Headteacher and the Senior Leadership Team to ensure the appropriate level of guidance and accountability to help the school provide successful teaching and learning for all pupils. The Governors pride themselves on being supportive, and there is a diverse range of experience on the Governing Body which enhances how they are able to support school improvement. The Governing Body is also visible in school as well as being on hand to assist where appropriate.

There are strong links to the local community, and the school utilises many community places and organisations to enhance the children's learning experiences. We work with Denbigh Library, Denbigh Castle, Theatr Twm o'r Nant, Dolwen Care Home, Llys Meddyg Care Home, Royal British Legion, Dementia Friends Denbigh, Denbigh Police Service, Denbigh Fire Service, local shops and supermarkets, local farms and many more.

The school is actively involved in the Denbigh schools' cluster - working together to improve outcomes for learners.

Outdoor learning is very important at Ysgol y Parc and we have developed our outdoor spaces to include our own Forest School site and our own Farm. At Ysgol y Parc we champion a love of nature and Biophilia. We know that time in natural spaces supports physical, emotional, and cognitive development, helping children grow into balanced, resilient, and environmentally conscious individuals.

We have staff who have completed the Trauma Informed Schools Diploma and these strategies form the basis for our Positive Behaviour and Relationships Policy.

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OUR CURRICULUM

OUR SCHOOL CURRICULUM AT YSGOL Y PARC

A school curriculum is everything a learner experiences in school. When designing our curriculum the needs of our learners are at the heart. We work as a team to carefully consider why, what and how we teach. We aim to inspire all our children to have a love of learning. Enabling the development of skills which will provide them with the foundations to build their future in an ever-changing world.



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OUR CURRICULUM



The Curriculum for Wales is taught through the six Areas of Learning and Experience (the WHAT). They are as follows:

- Expressive Arts
- Health and Wellbeing
- Humanities
- Languages, Literacy and Communication
- Mathematics and Numeracy
- Science and Technology

The four purposes are the starting point and aspiration for our schools' curriculum. Ultimately, the aim is to support our little learners to become:

- ambitious, capable learners, ready to learn throughout their lives
- enterprising, creative contributors, ready to play a full part in life and work
- ethical, informed citizens of Wales and the world
- healthy, confident individuals, ready to lead fulfilling lives as valued members of society



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OUR CURRICULUM



Relationships and Sexuality Education (RSE) is a mandatory element of the new curriculum and will be included through the cross-cutting elements of the curriculum, focusing on the three strands:

- Relationships and identity
- Sexual health and well-being
- Empowerment, safety and respect

The mandatory cross-curricular skills of Literacy, Numeracy and Digital Competence are essential to all learning and the ability to unlock knowledge. They enable our learners to:

- develop listening, reading, speaking and writing skills
- be able to use numbers and solve problems in real-life situations
- be confident users of a range of technologies to help them function and communicate effectively and make sense of the world.

Cross
Curricular



Religion, Values and Ethics (RVE) is a mandatory subject for all learners aged 3 to 16, part of the Curriculum for Wales. RVE is not just about religious studies, but also includes ethics, values, and philosophical perspectives. It aims to help our children to develop critical thinking skills, understand different viewpoints, and make informed decisions.

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RELATIONSHIPS AND SEXUALITY EDUCATION

The Governing Body believes that RSE should be taught with care and that the teaching should match the maturity of the pupils involved. Staff and Governors welcome discussions with parents should they have concerns regarding this area of the Curriculum.

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

RE is taught through the RVE (Religion, Values and Ethics) Lense and through the HUMANITIES AOLE. Understanding and empathy for others' beliefs are promoted through assemblies and through the Dragons - Ethical Elin and Healthy Hari.

COLLECTIVE WORSHIP

According to the Education Reform act we are required to ensure that pupils take part in an act of collective worship every day which may be whole school, or in other groups (except in religious groups). The majority of acts of collective worship in any school term shall be 'wholly or mainly of a broadly Christian character' and which 'reflect the broad traditions of Christian belief without being distinctive of any particular Christian denomination'. Collective worship is expected to foster a sense of community and provide the opportunity to celebrate the value of the school community. It enriches the lives of all present, enables the sharing of common emotions and contributes towards spiritual and moral development. Visitors from church and chapel, and possibly other religious communities, are invited to lead acts of collective worship. In accordance with the legal requirements, parents have the right to withdraw their children from acts of collective worship. Those who may wish to do so are asked to discuss their concerns with the Headteacher.

OUR CURRICULUM FOUNDATION LEARNING

Foundation Learning forms part of the 3 to 16 Curriculum for Wales and is designed to reflect the specific learning and development needs of children up to the age of 8 or learners who have additional developmental needs. Foundation learning focuses on the pedagogical teaching and learning approaches which scaffold the learning and development for all children in the early years.

At Ysgol Y Parc we ensure that we reflect on practice and provision when delivering our curriculum with a focus on...

- authentic and purposeful learning
- child development
- observation
- outdoor learning
- play and play-based learning



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OUR CURRICULUM

The Teaching at Ysgol Y Parc follows the Twelve Pedagogical Principles:

The 12 Pedagogical Principles (The HOW)

1. Focus on the FOUR PURPOSES of the Curriculum
2. High Expectations - GROWTH MINDSET
3. BLENDED TEACHING AND LEARNING - including direct teaching
4. Promote PROBLEM SOLVING, CREATIVE AND CRITICAL THINKING
5. Build on PREVIOUS KNOWLEDGE and ENGAGE LEARNERS
6. Create authentic contexts for learning - MAKE IT REAL AND MEANINGFUL
7. ASSESSMENT FOR LEARNING - Effective feedback
8. MAKE CONNECTIONS - Across Areas of Learning and Experience
9. CROSS-CURRICULUM RESPONSIBILITIES - Literacy, Numeracy and Digital Competence, and provide opportunities to practise them
10. LEARNING TO LEARN (VISIBLE LEARNING) - encourages children and young people to take increasing responsibility for their own learning
11. POSITIVE RELATIONSHIPS and WELLBEING (Pedagogy that supports social and emotional aspects of learning is important across every aspect of the curriculum)
12. Encourage COLLABORATION



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OUR CURRICULUM

SPORT

Physical Education is taught regularly to all pupils from Nursery to Year 2, under the HEALTH AND WELLBEING AOLE. All children take part in a range of sports and other physical activities, such as movement, gymnastics and athletics. We have excellent space and facilities. Being active and physically healthy is promoted through our HEALTH AND WELLBEING and through our Dragon, Healthy Hari.

LANGUAGE

Our language of communication is English. Welsh is taught as a second language to all classes through the Language, Literacy and Communication AOLE of the Curriculum for Wales and the Welsh Language Policy for schools in Denbighshire. We have a Welsh ethos and use incidental Welsh throughout everything we do and teach. All staff promote talking to and responding to learners through the use of Welsh. Welsh is used as a second language throughout school in daily activities and routine. As part of our work on the Curriculum for Wales all children are encouraged to explore and learn about the Welsh culture through many activities throughout the school year. We are part of the Cymraeg Campus initiative, we currently hold the Bonze Award.

OUR CURRICULUM

OUTDOOR LEARNING

Outdoor Learning is an integral part of how and we teach at Ysgol Y Parc. Outdoor education plays a key role in the development of our learners. Our children are given time to engage with the natural world which supports their physical, cognitive, emotional, and social growth.

1. Physical Development

Outdoor activities provide space and freedom for children to develop gross motor skills, balance, and coordination.

2. Cognitive Growth

Being outdoors stimulates curiosity and problem-solving.

3. Emotional and Mental Well-being

Nature has a calming effect on our children. Outdoor play allows children to express themselves more openly.

4. Social Skills

Outdoor play often involves more interactions which help children develop communication, cooperation and sharing.

5. Connection to Nature

Children develop a sense of care for the environment. Children who spend time outside develop an emotional connection to nature.

6. Academic Readiness

Outdoor Learning supports academic progress.

We have two Forest Schools trained practitioners in each unit within our school who deliver Forest School sessions alongside the class teachers.

All classrooms have their own Outdoor Classrooms with continuous access throughout the day. Provision in the outdoor classrooms are carefully planned by our Teachers and consideration is given to the organization and lay out of each outdoor class to suit the stage, needs and interests of the children.



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OUR CURRICULUM

PUPIL VOICE

We encourage pupils to play an active part in the life of the school and offer various opportunities for their voices to be heard.

We have combined our previous committees which were historically School Council, Eco Committee, E-Cadets and Criw Cymraeg to create Y SENEDD.

Y Senedd Children meet regularly to give children a voice within our school. They promote responsibility, respect and challenge along with the principles of democracy. The group meets regularly and their input is fed back into school improvement plans and to the Governing Body. They play an active part in the life of our school, and in the local community.

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OUR CURRICULUM

COMMUNITY AND EDUCATIONAL VISITS

Parental and community involvement is actively encouraged.

- Liaison exists with other local primary schools to extend and enhance the curriculum with benefit to all.
- Transition activities with the receiver Junior school
- Activities arranged at Denbigh High School.
- Invitations are extended to the community when celebratory events are held
- Community trips; visiting places within our local area to enhance learning.
- Christmas Carol singing for the residents of our local Care Homes.
- Enrichment activities arranged through Arts Council and Denbighshire's Enrichfest, etc.
- We take part in intergenerational work with Dolwen and Cysgodfa.

PERMISSIONS

All pupils will be given a form of consent to be filled in by parents when they start at Ysgol Y Parc. By completing this form the parent is agreeing to their child participating in school activities off site in the local area and in County. If the activity is out of the County, parents will be asked to complete another form before the activity is to take place - details of arrangements are set out on the form. The school uses the Evolve system which is supported by Denbighshire County Council to record their trips.



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WELLBEING AND DISCIPLINE

The school takes a Trauma Informed Schools approach to behaviour and well being. Our School Promises are our school Values and are kept simple in child appropriate language to help our children remember and understand them. As a Trauma Informed School we ensure that each child's needs are met by establishing good connections with our children by...

- Listening to them
- Empathising
- Attunement
- Making sense of their feelings
- Validating their feelings

Mrs Croft (Headteacher), Ms Cannon (Deputy Headteacher) and Mrs Price (ALNCo) all hold the TIS Diploma. Mrs McCloskey is currently working towards her diploma. All staff have undertaken TIS training and our ongoing vision for the school is for all Teaching Staff to have gained the diploma. Ms Croft also holds an accreditation as a Mental Health first aider for children and staff.

We have a Behaviour Policy, which is available for parents/carers, on request. This policy includes corrective procedures and more in-depth information.

Parents are always informed if we are experiencing difficulties with a child's behaviour and we value parent input and feedback. We believe that working together is best for the children. As a school following a Trauma Informed Approach, we are 'firm on the behaviour but gentle on the child'. Children are reminded of and taught about Our School Promises, and these are shared with parents;

- I promise to be kind and helpful.
- I promise to be honest.
- I promise to be gentle.
- I promise to listen.
- I promise to try our best.
- I promise to look after our school.

Rewards

Ysgol Y Parc are a school who believe that rewards should be non tangible and come from feeling of achievement and pride. Children are not motivated by a tangible award, e.g. stickers or points. Instead, our learners are motivated by a celebration of their achievements and progression, through sharing and acknowledging what they have achieved. In order for children to receive praise they will have used their 'learning powers' as part of the learning process. A Celebration WOW Assembly is held every Friday with the Headteacher where we celebrate learning, resilience and perseverance across all six AOLE's. This is a whole school assembly.

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PARENTS

PARTNERSHIPS WITH PARENTS/CARERS -

WORKING TOGETHER FOR THE BENEFIT OF THE CHILDREN

Having positive relationships with our families matters to us, and here is how we communicate and engage with families.

- Parents/carers are invited to a Transition Meeting every year to prepare them and their children for their next steps.
- We arrange for parents/carers to visit the school for an introduction into the way that reading and writing is taught and how they can help.
- We encourage parents/carers to help in school during special events
- Home-School Agreements: this agreement establishes a foundation for learning within the caring and purposeful ethos at school. You receive a copy on enrolling your child at Ysgol y Parc.
- Newsletters: We send out an electronic copy of the Newsletter every week with details of everything going on at school. This is sent on Seesaw and the Website.
- Our website is available for up-to-date information.
- Seesaw is an app to communicate with parents/carers and to involve them in their child's education.
- Friends of Ysgol y Parc Every year we encourage parents/carers to join our fundraising team.
- We provide two parents meetings with the class teachers- once in the first Autumn term and again in the first Summer term.
- Parents/carers are given a detailed and individualised report about their child's progress.

We are a 'Healthy School' and we encourage the children to eat healthily. We provide a healthy snack every Morning Break Time. The children are able to choose from a varied range of fruit and vegetables. We respectfully ask for a £1 contribution each week (20p per day) to help us to pay for the produce. We provide a drink of milk or water during break times. The children are also encouraged to bring in their own water bottles that can be refilled throughout the school day at the school's water cooler (which is regularly cleaned, checked, tested and serviced).

Free School Meals

In Wales, all primary school children are now entitled to universal free school meals. We have a variety of lunch options including hot meals, sandwiches, fruits and a dessert. Children can also bring in their own healthy lunch box. We cater for all dietary requirements. If your child has any dietary requirements please let the office know before your child begins school.

Healthy Schools

We are a 'Healthy School' and we have received the National Quality Award which we are extremely proud of. We pride ourselves in the work that we do with the children around Health and Wellbeing.

ADMISSIONS

Admissions to Nursery

An initial application for admission to the Nursery class of a school must be made to Denbighshire County Council. The Authority will admit a child to a maintained infant school at the beginning of the school year if the child has achieved its 3rd birthday on or before August 31st of that calendar year.

If the Authority is unable to allocate the child to the school for which the parent has expressed a preference, the parent will be offered a place for the child at an alternative school. The parent may then accept the alternative placement, or make representations to the Authority and, if still dissatisfied, may appeal. The appeal (which shall be sent to the Director of Lifelong Learning) must be in writing giving the reasons for the appeal. In the case of an appeal, the Authority will initiate the appeal procedure of the Education Act 1980. The parent will be given an opportunity to appear before an independent Appeal Committee. The decision of the Appeal committee will be final. There is no procedure of appeal to a Nursery Class.

Admissions to Reception

An application for admission to the Reception class must be made to Denbighshire County Council whilst your child is in Nursery. You will need to apply for Reception even if your child is in Nursery with us already.

Induction Day and Transition

Every year during the Summer Term we hold a Transition Day for all children to go up to their new classrooms and meet their new class teacher. On this day we also provide an 'open morning' for Nursery children and parents/carers to come and visit our Early Years unit.

ADMISSION OF PUPILS WITH DISABILITIES

The school has been adapted to enable pupils with disabilities to be admitted. There are some external ramps and we have an accessible toilet. All admissions are the responsibility of the Local Education Authority. When a child with a physical disability or a learning disability is accepted to Ysgol y Parc, the staff work in close conjunction with all external agencies involved with the child to ensure a smooth transition. All pupils are treated equally at Ysgol y Parc.

We ensure that we:

- Promote equality of opportunity between disabled persons and other persons.
- Eliminate discrimination that is unlawful under the Disability Discrimination Act (2005).
- Eliminate harassment of disabled persons that is related to their disabilities.
- Promote positive attitudes towards disabled persons.
- Encourage participation by disabled persons

ATTENDANCE

Parents have a statutory responsibility for ensuring that their compulsory school-age children receive an appropriate education appropriate to their age. This is through regular attendance at school. We recognise that for some children good attendance at school presents challenges which parents may need support with. This is why we work together with our families to ensure that parents receive the support they need to ensure their children achieve the best attendance they can.

The Governing Body has adopted Denbighshire's Policy for Attendance at School. Regular attendance is important. If your child is absent, please let us know the reason as soon as possible by a written letter, telephone call or email. Attendance that is below 90% is a cause for concern and will need to be investigated. Our Attendance Policy can be viewed on our website or copies can be obtained from the School Office by request. The main points, in brief are as follows:

- Family Holidays, taken during School Term Time, are not permitted and will be recorded as 'unauthorised'.
- A Fixed Term Penalty Notice may be awarded for ten unauthorised absences in any one Academic Year.
- Medical Appointments should be taken out of school hours where possible.
- Evidence of the appointment should be presented to the school in order for the absence to be authorised
- Pupils should maintain an average attendance of 95%+ to ensure that they make good progress in their learning

SITE SAFETY AND SECURITY

The safety of the staff and pupils is extremely important. We have a Health and Safety Policy, along with other policies and risk assessments, to ensure that all health and safety procedures are followed. Several members of staff supervise the children during playtimes and we ensure that safety rules are observed.

Parents are not permitted to enter the classrooms when bringing their children to school each morning. Children should be taken to their entrance gate, where the staff will be ready to lead them to their classrooms. If parents would like to speak to the teacher, you can see them at the school gate in the morning or alternatively, teachers are available after school from 3pm. Parents can also email the school make contact with the class teacher. We lock the school gates between 7:30am and 3.15pm. Parents/Guardians/Relatives are not permitted to bring their vehicles onto the school premises. If you are collecting your child by car, then you must park your car at an alternative location and walk across to the school yard. It is not safe to park on the narrow 'slip road' leading down to the school gates either. This is the school's driveway and is owned by the school. The police monitor the situation regularly.

The school gates and doors are locked after 9.00am and all visitors are requested to ring the bell outside the gate outside the main office.

- Fire drills are held every half term. The fire alarms are tested on a regular programme of checks.
- Risk Assessments are carried out and are up to date.
- Invacuation Drills (school lockdown) are held every half term.

SAFEGUARDING

SAFEGUARDING AND CHILD PROTECTION

The Department for Education and Employment and the Welsh Office guidance make it clear that schools and colleges have an important role to play in the protection of children against abuse. The All-Wales Child Protection Procedures are followed by all staff within the school and the school has a Safeguarding and Child Protection Policy which follows the Policy set by Denbighshire LA. The school has named staff who are responsible for Child Protection and a named Governor. All staff are trained in Child Protection procedures and all staff, volunteers, students and governors are DBS checked regularly. Ysgol y Parc has a duty to refer any concerns about the wellbeing of pupils to Denbighshire Social Services for investigation.

Mrs Liz Croft is the Designated Safeguard Lead for the school.

Ms Cannon and Mrs Price are the Deputy Designated Safeguard Leads.

As the children are responsible for their own clothes and shoes, every item needs to be marked with the child's name.

SPORTS KIT

- White polo shirt and black shorts or leggings
- Trainers or pumps

Waterproof coats must be sent to school every day.

Sun hats must be sent in on sunny days.

Warm hats, gloves and scarves are needed in the colder months as children spend equal amounts of time in the outdoors to indoors.

All children should have a pair of wellies in school.

Wetsuits are provided by the school with a small contribution towards the cost of purchasing new sets made via Parentpay.

ADDITIONAL LEARNING NEEDS

Statement of intent

We operate under the ALN Code in Wales. Under the code, pupils identified as having Additional Learning Needs are given extra support where required. The curriculum is differentiated to meet their needs but all pupils are given the opportunity to participate fully in all school activities. Parents are informed if their child has been identified as having additional learning needs and in some instances an IDP (Individual Development Plan) will be formed, in conjunction with parents and other agencies who may be involved. Parents are invited to review meetings to discuss in detail the progress being made by individual pupils. This meeting includes the Additional Learning Needs Co-ordinator and Class Teacher. A member of the Governing Body has responsibility for Additional Learning Needs.

We also identify our more able and talented pupils in all areas of the curriculum. Parents will be informed if their child has been identified as more able and talented and these pupils will be given opportunities to extend their learning.

ACCESSIBILITY PLAN

The Disability Discrimination Act (2005) requires that all schools should plan to increase access to school for disabled pupils. At Ysgol y Parc we will endeavour to ensure that the school becomes readily accessible to all pupils, parents, teachers and visitors who have disabilities. We have completed an accessibility action plan to attempt to achieve our aims. The school works closely with Denbighshire County Council in order to ensure that all the requirements are carried out within given timescales.

Looked After Children

The school works with Denbighshire's Education Liaison Officer for Looked After Children, to ensure that we are meeting the needs of all our LAC Pupils. We also work with other Local Authorities where LAC Pupils may attend our school from outside the County. We provide regular reviews and progress reports for these pupils. Every LAC pupil has a PEP (Personal Education Plan) which monitors the progress of the pupil against current targets and National Expectations. We have a Governor with responsibility for Looked After Children.

To enable all learners to be included and part of our school family at Ysgol Y Parc we ensure we have...

- a sense of belonging
- policies on learning, behaviour and bullying
- 'open door' policy for children and parents
- a whole school TIS approach to promoting good mental health
- good relationships between learners and staff
- positive learning behaviour management
- positive peer influences and friendships
- safeguarding and child protection policies
- active multi-agency communication
- effective staff training

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PARTNERSHIPS WITHIN THE COMMUNITY

School Nurse

The school nurses play a crucial role in supporting the health and wellbeing of our young children. Their role is a mix of health promotion, safeguarding, early intervention, and liaison with families and other professionals. They coordinate routine health checks in Reception such as hearing, vision, height, weight and refer on when needed. They support the school with monitoring and supporting children with ongoing medical conditions.

School Nurses might also be a part of safeguarding processes and work closely with designated safeguarding leads in school which might include attending multi-agency meetings. If a child has medical needs the school nurse will create an individual healthcare plan with the school.

Family Link Officer

Our Family Link Officers help support families to improve wellbeing, readiness for school, and overall family functioning. Our Family Link Officer attends the school at least one day per week to see children, liaise with teachers and meet parents. They can offer support and advice, early intervention, direct parents towards workshops/programmes, Language and Play Sessions and support for practical issues for the family.

Police Community Support Officer (PCSO)

The PCSO works with the school to prevent problems, build good relationships, and support safety and wellbeing with our children. They build relationships with pupils & staff, provide preventative education, support school behaviour, support our events at school, provide visits to enhance topics and provide a role model for our children.
